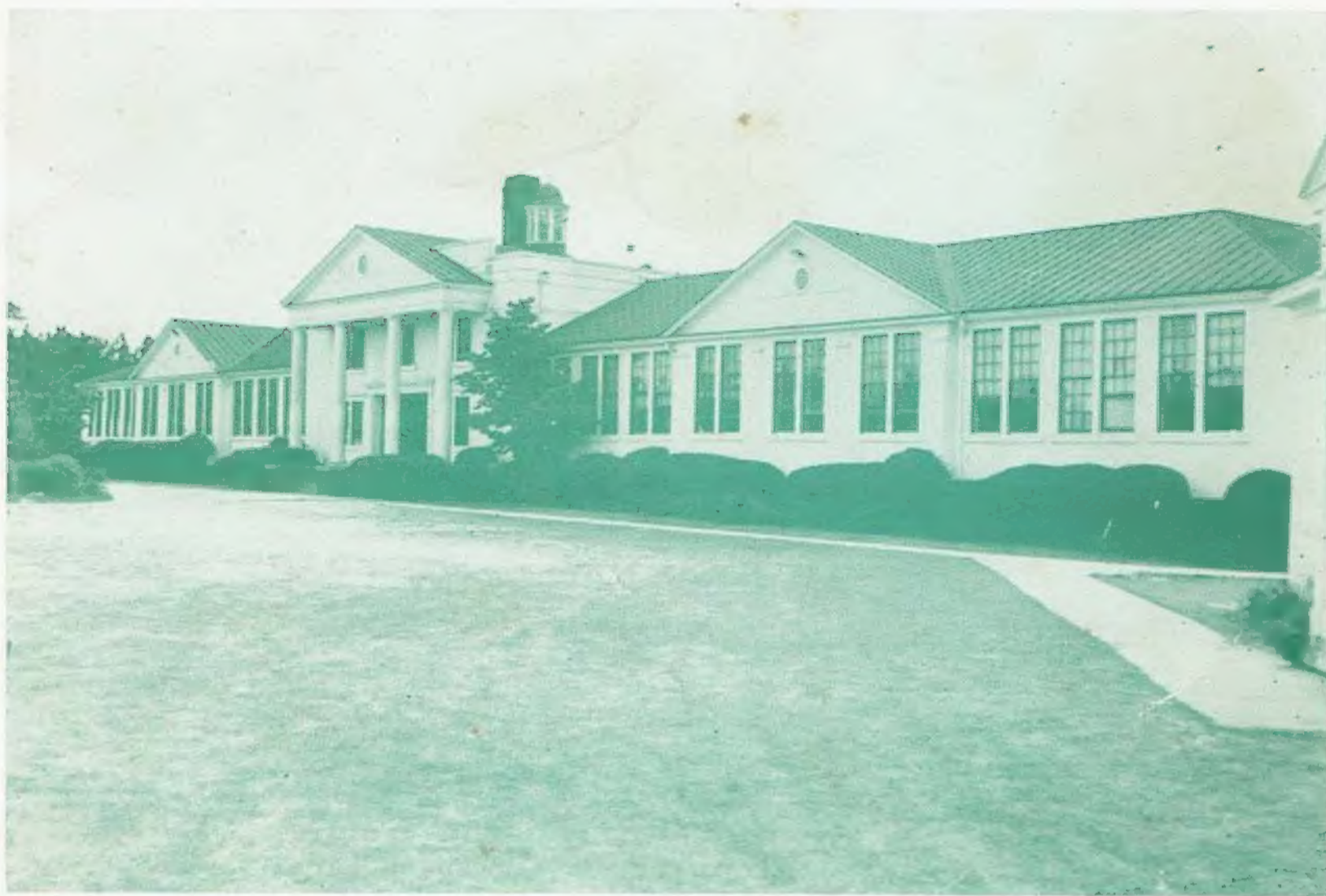

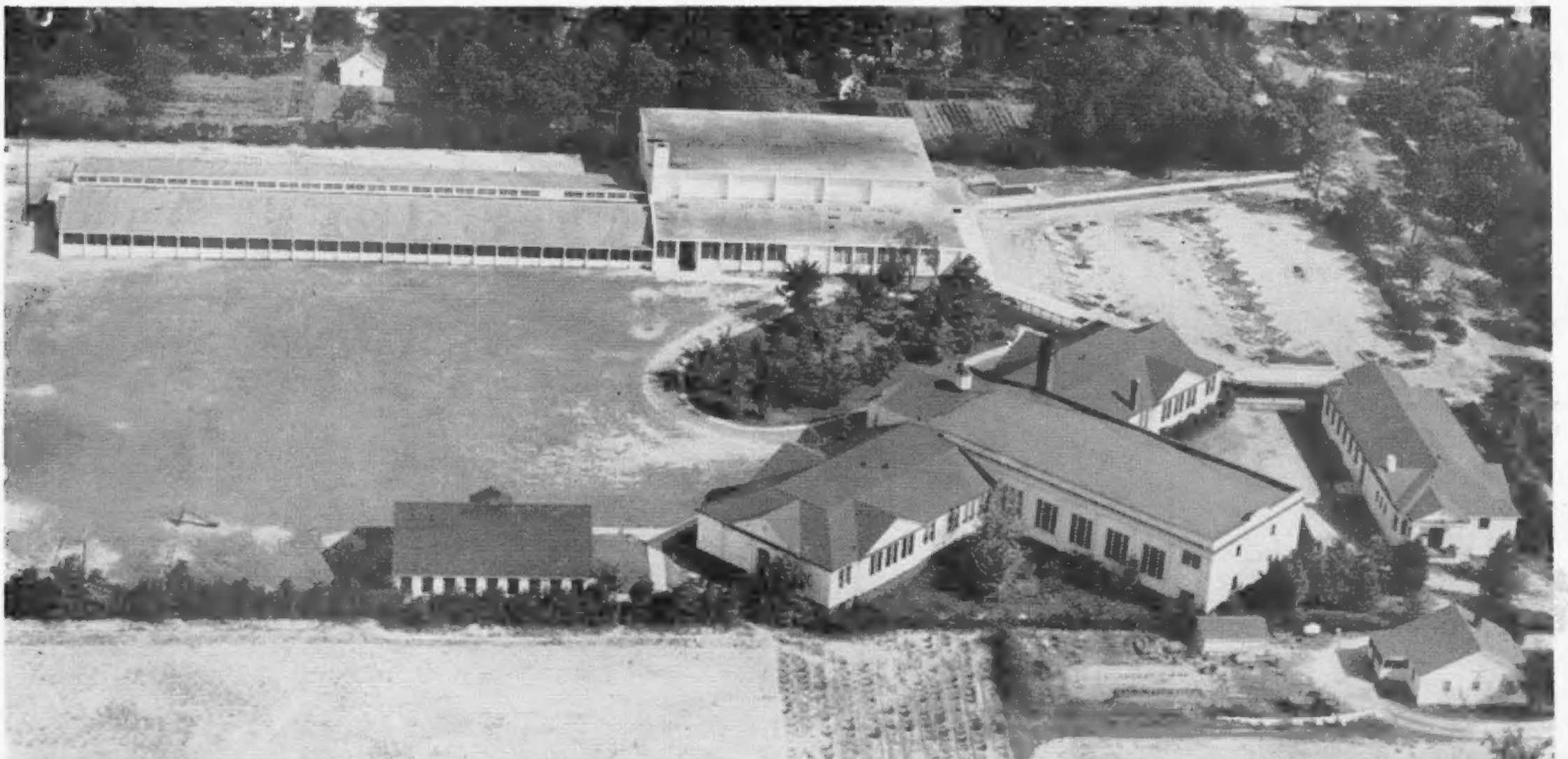
## 1955 Marshals

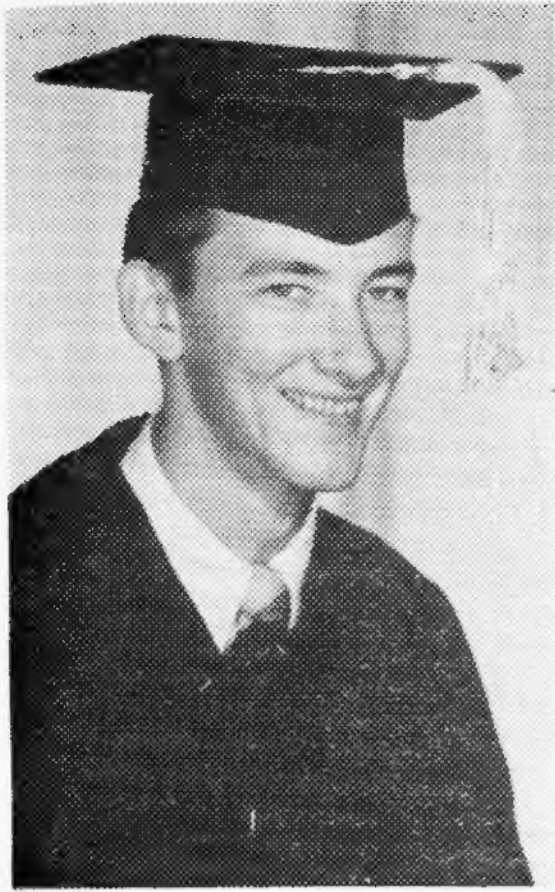

## Seniors and Juniors Go to Washington

At 7:30, April 20, 1955, the familiar maroon and gold bus loaded with twenty-five juniors, seniors, and chaperones left Pinehurst for the long awaited trip to Washington. A record was broken that morning when some of the students were on the bus before even the teachers were at school.

Our first stop was at Raleigh, where we were allowed to get out, stretch, and get something cold to drink. After a long ride, with a short stop for lunch at Southhill, Va., we arrived in Washington about 5:30. As we approached the suburbs of the city, we could see in the distance the Washington Monument and many other interesting things.

After we arrived at the Houston Hotel, we were assigned our rooms and we unpacked our bags. We were a weary and excited group. However, we soon were dressed and on our way to Thompson's Cafeteria for sup-

per. That evening almost everyone attended the ball game and saw Boston defeat Washington. It was at this game that we realized that we should have brought along heavier coats. With the temperature in the low 30's, we could sympathize with the Eskimos.

Thursday morning we began our tour of Washington. The F. B. I. Building proved most interesting to everyone. We visited the Department of Printing and Engraving, where we were impressed by the sight of stacks of ten-dollar bills. After lunch at a government cafeteria, we went to the Smithsonian Institution.

Next, we went on a conducted tour of the Capitol, and it was there that we had our group picture made. After this came the most tiring part of our trip — the climb to the top of the Washington Monument! That evening some of the group enjoyed a cruise on the Potomac.

The next day, Friday, we went to the home of Robert E. Lee and then to Arlington Cemetery, where we saw the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. While we were at Arlington, a military funeral took place and we were permitted to witness this. The flag-draped casket was borne on a caisson drawn by several horses. An honor guard attended. At the conclusion of the service, a twenty-one gun salute was fired.

We went to Mount Vernon and the airport. We saw the Lincoln Memorial, where on the walls are engraved some of Lincoln's greatest speeches, including the Gettysburg Address. We also visited Ford's Theater, where Lincoln was assassinated.

Friday afternoon we were free to do whatever we wished. Most of the girls went shopping, while the boys went to Glen Echo Amusement Park. That night we went to the Lotus Night Club where we enjoyed a delicious

meal and a good floor show.

Our trip back was through the beautiful Shenandoah Valley. We stopped at the Endless Caverns. After lunch there, we had a two-hour walk through the caverns. We stopped for a short while at Natural Bridge; then drove on to Roanoke where we had supper at the S&W cafeteria. At 1:30 A.M. the bus pulled in to the Pinehurst School grounds and a tired and happy bunch greeted parents and friends.

Our sincere appreciation goes to the ones who made this trip possible — to Mr. Cannon, who "engineered" it all, to the students and teachers who worked so hard to make the money needed, to Mrs. Whitesell, Mr. Jenkins, and Mr. Cannon, who were such wonderful chaperones, and last but not least, to Mr. Wilson who drove our bus so well.

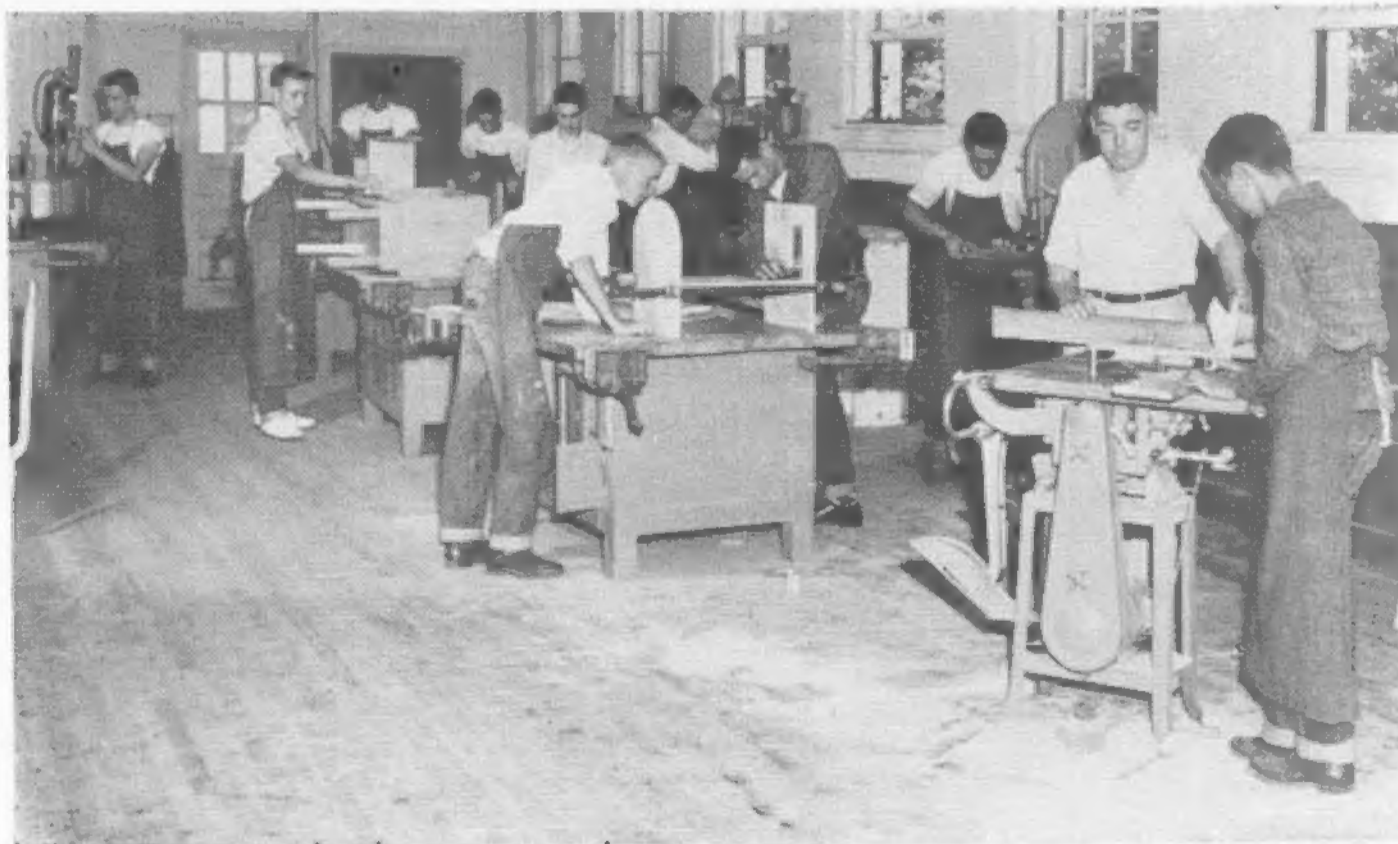
